## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

### Camp Week

Many students and staff will regard this week's camps as the highlight of their year. The reasons for this are varied but we like to think that the common ingredient is 'working with others'. In every camp, students are working outside their comfort zone. They learn how to support one another through these moments into what becomes almost a 'rite of passage'. On camp, they are given opportunities to work in real life situations outside the confines of the school fence. They are given the opportunity to push themselves in endless ways and they all do.



Still, in my experience, what is even more valuable are those moments that are totally unplanned. I'll never forget on our last Melbourne Camp when we had several of these. The first involved three, year 5 boys who upon realising that we had left over rolls in our lunch asked if they could share them with a homeless person sitting nearby. The man willingly accepted the rolls, said the kids were "Little Legends" and gave the teachers a wink. This lesson of giving was not on our itinerary but what it taught the whole group about humility was priceless. The second moment occurred one morning when the whole group ended up in the street out the front of our accommodation, some of us still in pyjamas, after the fire alarm went off due to a piece of burnt toast. It became a real-life fire drill. As simple as they were, these two moments became highlights that many students shared as their favourites when they graduated. True we come to school learn the basic skills that are required through life but boy it is nice to put them into practice sometimes too.

In 2019, we will be reviewing our current camp schedule. The staff at TVPS believe that camps play a critical role in a student's education but we also understand the financial pressures that come with them, particularly when families have more than one child attending. We will be assessing our current camps according to:

- When they occur? Spacing camps out to relieve pressure on families with multiple students. Giving families enough notice on camps so they can set up a payment plan.
- What are the benefits? We have different camps for different reasons but we need to keep reviewing whether a camp is providing what we need.
- Value for money? We are beginning to compare our current structure with other schools to find the best opportunities for our students whilst providing the best value for money for parents.

I would like to thank, you the parents, for the way you continue to support our camps. By sending in notes and payments in a timely manner you make our job so much easier. By preparing your students with the items they require and the right mindset, you make our camps less stressful.

And I would especially like to thank the staff (both classroom and admin) who give so much of their time to plan each camp so it is informative, fun, relevant, safe and runs to schedule. And that all of this is relayed to the students and their families....no easy task. There is no overtime or time in lieu, the time each staff member gives is their own choice. Make sure you thank the staff members at the end of each camp because without them, there just wouldn't be a camp.

## **CHILD SAFETY STANDARDS**

### **WHAT WE EXPECT AT TARWIN VALLEY PRIMARY SCHOOL**

- ❖ Everyone connected to our school can help children be safe.
- ❖ We have zero tolerance of any abuse of children.
- ❖ We have policies and procedures in place to protect the care, safety and welfare of children.
- ❖ There are clear boundaries about how adults in our school community may interact with our students.
- ❖ The new Child Safe Standards go further than child protection arrangements did in the past.
- ❖ The Child Safe Standards apply to school staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors and students' family members.
- ❖ Keeping children safe is everyone's responsibility.
- ❖ We want to ensure you know how we are keeping your children safe at school, and how we would like you to support us.
- ❖ Unsupervised contractors will be asked about their child safety arrangements as a condition of working with us if they work with children enrolled in the school (or children can reasonably be expected to be present while they are at the school).
