This morning was no different but as I hurtled down Old Waratah Road I saw her 'running late for the bus' — slowly walking down the road pulling the petals from a flower and scattering them. I got to the end of the road and saw the bus already at the bus stop and then looked back at my 'flower girl' in frustration. I did a u-turn and raced her to the bus — again telling her the time and chasing the clock all the way to school.

On the way to work I pondered on all of this rushing and stressing in the mornings and wondered what does this do to us? I thought about my daughter and while she needs to have strategies for managing time, it is also fair to consider the pause she took in her morning with a mindful stroll and a flower.

SCHOOL COUNCIL REPORT

At our recent first School Council meeting Gene and Pete talked to us about how the school was settling down for the year ahead and how the learning programs were starting and being received.

CHILD SAFETY STANDARDS
WHAT WE EXPECT AT MEENIYAN PRIMARY SCHOOL

- **!** Everyone connected to our school can help children be safe.
- We have zero tolerance of any abuse of children.
- ❖ We have policies and procedures in place to protect the care, safety and welfare of children.
- ❖ There are clear boundaries about how adults in our school community may interact with our students.
- The new Child Safe Standards go further than child protection arrangements did in the past.
- The Child Safe Standards apply to school staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors and students' family members.
- Keeping children safe is everyone's responsibility.
- ❖ To ensure you know how we are keeping your children safe at school, and how we would like you to support us.
- ❖ Unsupervised contractors will be asked about their child safety arrangements as a condition of working with us if they work with children enrolled in the school (or children can reasonably be expected to be present while they are at the school.
